Eduardo Simoes

Dr. Eduardo Simoes is a researcher, educator and leader.

Simoes conducts research related to health management and informatics: acquiring, analyzing and protecting patient information and the technology used in the process. Among other topics, he examines methods to improve health care planning, policy development, management and evaluation; information technology for monitoring preventable disease; public health programs; and global health initiatives.

At the University of Missouri, Simoes teaches courses in epidemiology (disease incidence and control), preventive medicine and public health applications of information technology. Before joining MU in 2011, he provided leadership for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, directing the Division of Adult and Community Health's Prevention Research Center Program Office. Prior to that, Simoes served the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services as chief epidemiologist.

Simoes has published more than 26 reports, 136 peer reviewed articles and 13 book chapters in the health field. He has presented at more than 150 national and international conferences, 48 as invited speaker. He has obtained \$21 million in external funding for research. He has consulted for numerous organizations including the World Bank, World Health Organization, Pan American Health Organization and ministries of health of Mexico, Brazil, Japan, China and Italy. He is a fellow of the American College of Epidemiology.

Dr. Eduardo Simoes is the Stuart Wesbury Distinguished Professor, Alumni Distinguished Professor and chair of Health Management and Informatics in the School of Medicine.
